Mon. (Jan. 1) "Uncle" Mahlon Rohrer, at his home near Belle Flower. He lived with his son Charles. He was found lying dead in the floor of his old homestead. Native of Maryland, lived some time in Ohio, then came to MO about the close of the war. His wife died several years ago. Leaves a son and four daughters, all married. Providence Cemetery. (5Jan1900)

New Year's Day (Jan. 1) little Madge, dau of Mr/Mrs J.J. Orr, age 3y, of membranous croup. Middletown. (12Jan1900)

Tues. (Jan. 2) Louis Roessling, son-in-law of Jno. Crews of Montg City, killed by the Wabash fast mail train No. 1. He had been in Jonesburg, and had boarded the afternoon train for Pendleton. He was taken on to Warrenton, and after supper, he started to walk up the track to Pendleton, about 4 miles. He had his overcoat collar buttoned up closely around his neck and his cap pulled down over his ears, so he failed to hear the train as it slipped up behind him. He was killed instantly and was badly mangled. Buried in city cemetery, Montg City. About 40 years of age. (5Jan1900)

Jan. 2, 1900, Louis Reighling. Leaves wife, 3 children. (19Jan1900)

Jan. 2, 1900, Mrs. Dan Hudson, age 62y, at her home south of Wellsville. Buried Old Bethel. (19Jan1900)

Jan. 4, 1900, Lena, little daughter of Anna and S.E. Bowles, age 1y 3m 10d, of pneumonia. (12Jan1900)

Last week (n.d.) Mrs. Kennedy Chambers, at her home in OK Terr, formerly of the Walnut Grove community. Middletown news (2Feb1900)
Obituary - Mrs. Sallie E. Chambers, wife of Kennedy Chambers, formerly of Montg co, died at her home near Carney, OK, Jan. 4, 1900, after 14 days of illness, age 60y 2m 18d. She was born in Lexington, KY, and moved with her parents, James & Frances McConnell to Gamma in 1859. She married Kennedy Chambers May 29, 1862. They had 9 children, 8 are living: Mrs. Carrie Hassler of Farmington, MO; Mrs. Ellen Sherman, Mauckport, IN; Mrs. Fannie Dunlap and Mrs. Effie Davis of Hennessee, OK; Lee of Avery, KS; Miss Sallie, Price and Allie of Carney, OK. She united with the Christian church in Middletown in Jan. 1871. They moved from Montg co to Dodge City, KS in 1885; from there to Okla. in 1889. (9Feb1900)

Jan. 5, 1900, "Aunt" Betty Morris of Gamma. Mabry graveyard. (12Jan1900)

Jan. 5, 1900, Marlin Farmer, son of Mr/Mrs M.A. Farmer, at home of his parents in Farmer, after a long illness. He had been taken by his mother to NM for his health, but to no avail. Middletown news (19Jan1900)

Jan. 7, 1900, Mrs. Elizabeth Stignall Logan. Born in Indiana on Mar. 18, 1831. In 1837 she was brought to MO where she lived until her death. On Apr. 27, 1853, she married Joseph H. Logan who died more than 35 years ago. They had 5 children, all survive. City cemetery. (12Jan1900)

Jan. 9, 1900, at her home near Danville, Mary Josephine Gregory, wife of Theodore. She was born in the house where she lived, reared her family and died, age 59y, the old Appling house, settled in the early part of the century. Leaves her husband and 6 daughters. Methodist church. (12Jan1900)

Jan. 9, 1900, Mrs. Dick Clements, age 73, at her home south of Wellsville. Buried Old Bethel. (19Jan1900)

Jan. 12, 1900, Mrs. Rudolph Ahmann, born Wilhelmina Ahmann near Marthasville Warren co, Mar. 29, 1835. She married Dec. 19, 1856. They moved to Montg Co during the winter of 1856-57 and settled on a farm near Price's Branch. Her husband died Mar. 4, 1888, and she stayed on there with her children, all now grown. Three sons and a daughter survive her. They had 8 children. Surviving: John, Charles and Walter Ahmann, Mrs. Jno. Cope. Member of Presbyterian church. Buried beside her husband. (19Jan1900)

Jan. 13, 1900, at his home near Jonesburg, C.B. Eddens, after a short illness with pneumonia. (2Feb1900)

(N.d.) recently in Washington State Insane Asylum, Edward H. Coates, the dentist, committed suicide. He married Miss Minnie Lentz of St. Charles co in the 1870's. His widow and children are living in Colo. He is a brother of the dentist who has practiced in New Florence for many years. (26Jan1900)

Jan. 18, 1900, J.P. Sigler, at his home south of Martinsburg and was buried at Liberty. Wellsville news (2Feb1900)

Last Sat. (Jan. 20) John Pritchett, age 83y, at his home on Indian Creek in the Smyrna community. Born near Clarksville, he was the first white child ever born in Pike co. When he was 6, his family became afraid of the Indians, and went back to KY on horseback, the mother carrying a 6w old babe in her lap. Mr. Pritchett married a Miss Martin, sister to Mrs. J. Vermillion of Middletown, and they had 3 children, Abraham, William and Ira, but only Ira and his mother survive. Mr/Mrs Pritchett lived together for 60y. Buried Smyrna. (26Jan1900)

Sat. (Jan. 20) Miss Nellie McCoy, a spinster, at the home of her nephew, W.J. Reisnor of Wellsville. She would have reached her 100th birthday in 25 days. Born in Northumberland co, PA, Feb. 14, 1800, came to Freeport, IL, in 1848, and in 1870 moved to Montg co. At her 85th birthday, she was stricken with paralysis, and from then on was an invalid. Member of the Congregational church. She had a spinster sister who died some years ago at an advanced age. (26Jan1900)

Sun. (Jan. 21) Mrs. Esther Ann Halslip, age 74y, at her home east of Middletown. Born near Scottville, VA, Mar. 4, 1826. Came to MO with her husband, the late Jas. Halslip, Sr. in 1835. Settled first near Louisville, Lincoln co, then 2y later moved to Montg co to the home place where she lived until her death. Member of the Martinsburg Baptist church. City cem. Wellsville items (26Jan1900)

Jan. 21, 1900, John E. Bobbs, at his home east of Montg City, of pneumonia, in his 81st year. Born in Groenstedt, Germany, Oct. 19, 1819. Came to this county in 1843 and lived here since. Married in 1850 to Miss Rachel Jane Smith of Danville. They had 8 children, all still living, but their mother died more than 8y ago. Member Lutheran church. Buried beside his companion. (26Jan1900)

Jan. 22, 1900 at his home in Wellsville, Alden Roberts. Born May 3, 1826 in Albany, NY. Came to Ohio in 1846; married Miss E.L. Seager in 1853; came to MO in 1883 and lived here until his death. Wellsville items (2Feb1900)

Tues. (Jan. 23) of pneumonia, the 10y old daughter of John Sailor, west of Montg City. New Hope cemetery. (26Jan1900)

Mon. (Jan. 29) in Pettis co at his home, Thos H. Martin, brother of Mrs. C.P. Evered, age 63y. (2Feb1900)

Last Wed. (Jan. 31) Mrs. Mary Price of near Bachelor, Callaway co, of typhoid-pneumonia. A cousin of Mrs. Hughes Maupin of Montg City. (9Feb1900)

Last Sat. (Feb. 3) Mrs. Mattie Boswell and Sun. (Feb. 4) Mrs. Taswell Moore, both of typhoid-pneumonia at the home of John Sailor. They went there to nurse the 10y old child of Mr. Sailor and both contracted the disease. Mrs. Boswell was a widow with no children. She was buried at Bethel church. Mrs. Moore, mother of Mrs. Boswell, was about 60y old, leaves 2 children, Mrs. Bradley Harper of St. Louis and a son who lives on Loutre. She was buried at Augusta church beside her husband. (9Feb1900)

Sun. (Feb. 4) Christ Welner, dropped dead of heart failure. Buried Tues. New Florence items (16Feb1900)

Mon. (Feb. 5) at Fulton, Dayton Berry from lung trouble. Brother of George Berry of Middletown. (9Feb1900)

Feb. 7, 1900, Minnie Mildred Maxey, born Jan. 27, 1889, age 11y 11d, at home of her mother, Mrs. Edwin Summers. Leaves her mother and a sister. Buried beside her father in New Providence cemetery. (16Feb1900)

Wed. (Feb. 7) R.P.C. Keele, of typhoid-pneumonia. Buried at New Providence church. Leaves wife and 3 children. (9Feb1900)

Elder W.L. Carr will preach the funeral of R.P.C. Keele at High Point church on Apr. 8. He died Feb. 7, but the roads were impassable then, and as Mr. Keele had requested Elder Carr to preach the funeral, he will do so on the above date. (6Apr1900)

Obituary - R.P.C. Keele departed this life Feb. 7, 1900, age 50y 1m 7d. Leaves wife, 3 children and a stepdaughter, and his parents. Typhoid pneumonia. (13Apr1900)

Feb. 7, 1900 at Kansas City, Mrs. Steven Feike. (16Feb1900)

Last Thurs. (Feb. 8) Sylvester Bonnel, son of U. Bonnel of Montg City, of typhoid-pneumonia. Buried at Brush Creek cem. (16Feb1900)

Feb. 8, 1900, James Sylvester Bonnel, age 24y 2m 12d, son of U. Bonnel and wife of Montg City. Born near Bellflower. Ves had been afflicted from

childhood. In Feb. 1898 he married Miss Maggie Jane Harper who died 11m ago. Leaves his parents, 4 sisters, 2 brothers. (23Feb1900)

Last Wed. (Feb. 14) A.J. Moore, an early settler of Middletown, age c70y. Died suddenly. Leaves widow and 3 children: Mrs. Jas. Jarboe, Mrs. Jas. Dillon and Joel C. Moore. (23Feb1900)

Wed. (Feb. 14) at his home near Louisiana, Pike co, Lang McQuie uncle of Rev. R.E. McQuie, age c90y. (23Feb1900)

Feb. 17, 1900, Ed Dickey. Born in Montg co June 21, 1844, age 55y 7m 4d. In 1861 he went to Calif. where he remained until 1890, and came back to MO. He married Miss Maggie Bishop Aug. 17, 1892 by Rev. B.D. Sipple, who also preached his funeral Feb. 19 at Bethel church. He was a brother of Gibson Dickey and Mrs. Houstin of Montg City. (23Feb1900)

Feb. 17, 1900, Mrs. Lizzie Wells, at home of Wm. Rinawan. Bur in Macedonia cem. Leaves two bros: I.C. and W.B. Williams. Pine Knot items (2Mar1900)

Feb. 18, 1900, Mrs. Katharine Weiss. Born Nov. 14, 1824 at Obrigheim in Province Baden, Germany; came to America in 1854; was married to George J. Weiss in Dutchtown, IL, the same year. They had 7 children, only 2 survive, George and John. In 1856 they moved to Warrenton, MO and in 1883 to Montg City, where Mr. Weiss died June 1890. Member of German Evangelical Protestant church. Tribute by D.B. Sipple. (23Feb1900)

Last week (n.d.) in Louisville, Miss Mary Jo Bilbro, a former resident of Middletown. (23Feb1900)

Feb. 20, 1900, Mrs. Margaret Parsons, at her home near Olney, age 70y. Born near Danville Oct. 28, 1830. Leaves 10 children. Bur at Olney cemetery. Pine Knot items (2Mar1900)

Feb. 20, 1900, Mrs. Minerva Gibson, age 75y 4m, at home of her son-in-law, Thos. Thurman north of Wellsville. Bur in the Slavens cem in Lincoln co. (2Mar1900)

Feb. 21, 1900, Joel Willis, age c 82y, at his home north of Middletown. He resided in Pike co for many years. Leaves wife and 2 daughters. (9Mar1900)

Feb. 22, 1900, Mrs. Effie Dugan, age 88, at her home in Middletown. Born in Shelby co, KY in 1812; married George Dugan in 1832; came to MO in 1853. Mother of 11 children, survived by 7. Her husband and 4 children died many years ago. United with Buck Creek Baptist ch in 1837, and with the Middletown Baptist ch when they moved there. Middletown cem. (9Mar1900)

(N.d.) in Mexico, little Adaline Alvey, age 4y 4m 20d, dau of Mrs. Florence Alvey of Montg City. She had been taken to Mexico for medical treatment for Brights' disease. City cem. (2Mar1900)

Feb. 23, 1900, Mrs. Beatrice Sevall, wife of Harlan Sevall, at home of her uncle H.E. Humes, Canyon, TX, age 23y. She lived in Wellsville for 2y. (16Mar1900)

Last Thurs. (Feb. 24) Mrs. Rudd, an aged lady, at home of her son-in-law, John Shaw on West Prairie. Buried in Rudd burying ground, Pike co. (2Mar1900)

Feb. 24, 1900, "Aunt" Missouri Ingram, at Truxton. Born near Auburn, Lincoln co, June 22, 1824, and lived in MO all her life. She married John Ingram in 1864. (9Mar1900)

Sun. (Feb. 26) - Ernest Aubuchon and wife came from St. Louis where they were summoned last week to attend the bedside of his mother. She died Sunday. New Florence items (2Mar1900)

Feb. 27, 1900, D.F. (Doc) Graham near Minneola at his home, age 74y. Gregory burying ground. (2Mar1900)

Feb. 27, 1900, near Rudy, Crawford co, Ark., Eliza Nunnelly, age 70y. She lived for many years near Truxton. Her maiden name was Eliza Ernest. Truxton items (30Mar1900)

Mar. 1, 1900 in St. Charles, MO, Lillian, the 18m old dau of Mr/Mrs Willard Admyre, after an illness of 10 days. The mother was Miss Nellie Adams of Middletown. (16Mar1900)

Last Fri. (Mar. 2) D.C. Smith, age 68y, father of Mrs. Phil Kopp, at the Kopp res in Montg City. His home was at New Bethlehem, Cooper co, but had been visiting his daughter the past 3 months. A few weeks ago he was stricken with pneumonia from which he did not recover. Mr. Kopp accompanied the body to New Bethlehem for burial. (9Mar1900)

Last Fri. (Mar. 2) Mrs. Suhr, at her home near Price's Branch, of pneumonia. Leaves husband and 5 sons. Bur at Presbyterian cem. (9Mar1900)

Mar. 3, 1900, Mrs. Gray, mother of Mrs. Loe and Mrs. Marshall at the home of Mrs. Marshall in New Florence. (9Mar1900)

Mon. (Mar. 4) Jas. Hart of Wellsville, age c 55y, of pneumonia. Buried Tues. (9Mar1900)

Obituary - Jas. D. Hart was born in Mt. Vernon, Ohio, July 16, 1844, and died Mar. 4, 1900, age 55y 7m 16d, at his home in Wellsville. He married 4 March 1869 to Miss Hattie Roberts and they had 2 daus. The oldest died at age 9. Mar. 6, 1900, Amanda, the 5y old dau of B.G. Parsons and wife, at the family home near Marling, after a short illness of diphtheria. Buried at Indian Creek cem. (16Mar1900)

Mar. 7, 1900 - Obituary - Mary E. Hudnall was born in Bedford co, VA, Sep. 25, 1813, and died at the home of Mrs. Nancy Covington, east of Williamsburg, Mar. 7, 1900. She had suffered with cancer for more than a year. She was never married. (16Mar1900)

Mar. 8, 1900, at Troy, Levi J. Garrett, prominent in turf circles, having owned and raced several horses of note. (16Mar1900)

Sun. (Mar. 11) at her home near Danville, Mrs. Marion Baker. Bur in New Florence cem. Her daughters, Misses Maggie, Elsie, Sallie, Annie and Olive of St. Louis were at the burial. (16Mar1900)

Mar. 11, 1900 - Obituary - Mrs. Marion Baker - Francis Anna Stevens was born Jan. 2, 1828, in VA; came to MO with her parents when 4y of age and lived the rest of her life in Montg co. Dau of Rev. Wm. Stevens, a Baptist minister. Married Silvester Marion Baker on Feb. 19, 1847. They had 11 children, all survive but one son. Her husband died Feb. 17, 1890, age 73y 2m 9d. Of the 10 living children, 5 reside in St. Louis, 3 as teachers in the city schools. A daughter is in the west; Mrs. Graham lives near Minneola, and the 2 sons live at the family home near Danville. Mr. Baker bought it in 1852 from Rev. Andrew Monroe, a pioneer Methodist minister. (16Mar1900)

At the age of 20y, he enlisted in the 155th PA Volunteers in which he served 3y, and participated in a number of the hottest fought battles of the war, including Gettysburg. In 1868 he married Miss Emily Copeland in PA. They had 3 children: William, Cale and Mrs. Mattie Mabry. Two bros and 3 sisters survive. Member of C.P. church. (23Mar1900)

W.B. Douglass left Thurs. for Charlotte, NC, where the Philadelphia ball club practices. (23Mar1900)

Mar. 14, 1900, Israel Duey, age 68, at his home in Giddings, TX of blood poison caused by an abscess in his side. A brother is White Duey. Deceased was treasurer of his county for 15y. (23Mar1900)

Recently (n.d.) the baby of Will Day and wife. Buried at Union Chapel. Gamma items (23Mar1900)

Mar. 17, 1900, little Charlie Day, son of Wm. Day, age 3y 4m. Belle Flower items (30Mar1900)

Mar. 30, 1900, Mrs. Druzilla Cochran, at her residence west of Gamma, after an illness of only a few days. Born in Hamilton co, OH, Aug. 8, 1857, and in 1869 her parents moved to Montg co. Fri. (Mar. 30) Phillip Gates of Callaway, about 75y old, at his home. Buried in Antioch. (6Apr1900)

Recently (n.d.) Mrs. John Poindexter of Minneola. She was buried at the Bryant graveyard. She had suffered much of late. (6Apr1900)

Mar. 30, 1900, Mrs. Matilda Poindexter, wife of John, at her home near Minneola. Born Jan. 24, 1830. Leaves husband, 4 children. (20Apr1900)

Mon. John Dowdall, about 68y old, at his home near Wellsville, while sitting at the dinner table. He had enjoyed his usual health, and died suddenly. (6Apr1900)

Apr. 1, 1900, John Dowall died suddenly at his home near Martinsburg. Born in Ireland in 1833, came to America in 1848. In 1858 he married Miss Ellen Fleming, who survives with 4 children. He lived in IL until 1880 when he came to MO. (13Apr1900)

Tues. (Apr. 3) Aunt Winnie Polston, colored, at her home in Wellsville, age 106. Wellsville items (13Apr1900)

Wed. (Apr. 4) Frank Johnson, a negro, who has been in the employ of Dr. Evans at High Hill, was drowned in the tank pond. He and Dr. Evans' little boy were in a skiff, which they were unable to manage, and the wind was blowing so strong they became frightened and jumped out. The little boy caught some willows and clambered back into the boat, from which he was rescued. The negro went down and never reappeared. His body was recovered late in the afternoon. (6Apr1900)

Last Tues. (Apr. 3) Mrs. Mary Woollam, at her home in St. Louis, age 70y last month. Leaves a dau, Lucy and 3 sons, Edward, John J. and William. Buried in Price's Branch cem beside her loved ones. (13Apr1900)

(N.d.) the infant child of Philip Smith and wife was buried at Brush Creek Sat. morning. Gamma items (20Apr1900)

Apr. 15, 1900 - Obituary - Judge Milton Cox died on the 15th at his home in Wellsville. Born in Ralls co, MO, May 9, 1830, where he grew to manhood. He spent some years in school teaching. At the age of 12, he was converted to Christ, and united with the Baptists. He moved to Montg co in 1869 and spent the rest of his life here. Leaves a wife and large family of children. After the war he removed to St. Louis to practice medicine, having an

office opposite the Southern Hotel. In 1870 he became a member of the St. Louis Medical Society, and was made pres. of the MO State Medical Assoc. In 1884 he was a delegate to the World's Medical Assoc. at Copenhagen. At these meetings, the King acted as president ex officio, and Dr. Maughs was made a Lord. He was given a banquet at the King's palace.

He was the author of several universally read books on medicine and travel. He made a fortune as a practicing physician in St. Louis, and at his death, owned several very valuable pieces of real estate. He was a great friend of the late Dr. W.B. New Florence cem. Most of a column was given to his accomplishments. (3Jan1902)
